## How does SWA address the WASH problem?



- Increasing political prioritization for sanitation, water and hygiene
- 2 Strengthening government-led national processes
- Developing and using a strong evidence base to support good decision-making
- Strengthening regional, national and local human and institutional capacities
- Following-up and reviewing progress achieved in implementing sanitation, water and hygiene targets of the SDGs

## Objectives 2, 3 and 4: Four behaviours for SWA partners



- Enhance government leadership of sector planning processes
- 2. Strengthen and use country systems

- 4. Record all funds for water and sanitation in the national budget

## **Our impact**



**Benin**'s government reports that HLM participation was influential in raising political will and improved engagement with multiple partners.

By mid-2015, **Finland** reported they had already reached the one million people they committed to supporting with the provision of water and sanitation services at the 2014 HLM.

**Afghanistan** reports that lessons learned from other countries at SWA meetings were of critical value in developing national processes.



In **Paraguay**, SWA's influence is facilitating a change of paradigm, where government leads action, and encourages participation from citizens, aid agencies, NGOs, the private sector and local governments.
