




Upgrading of sanitation services has implications for the cost and for institutions to support operation and maintenance

1. Priority is to be on peri-urban sanitation in low income countries - high population densities, low water consumption rates, and low-incomes


2. Financing peri- urban sanitation can only work through the water bill of the local water utility (also within the Netherlands!)
